



Cutting edge research for patients with depression - RTG 2621

General practitioners are central for patients with depression as they usually provide initial diagnosis and treatment. Physical and other psychological diseases conceal symptoms and complicate therapy. In Munich, the DFG-funded Research Training Group POKAL (RTG 2621 "PrädiktOren und Klinische Ergebnisse bei depressiven ErkrAnkungen in der hausärztLichen Versorgung") will develop new diagnostic and therapeutic approaches starting October 2021.



16 doctoral positions in diagnostics, treatment and application

- Use of guidelines in primary care (Prof. Dr. Peter Henningsen, TUM, Clinic for Psychosomatic Medicine and Psychotherapy) "The more patients are taken care of according to guidelines, the more people get better."
- Digital data instruments for patients with depression (Prof. Dr. Helmut Krcmar, TUM, Chair for Information Systems) "The basis for advice and support are one's personal data."
